Research in the Age of Generative AI

AI can accelerate research, but it changes the writer's responsibilities. The central rule is simple: an AI answer is a lead until you verify it against a real source.

Use AI for Discovery, Structure, and Questions

Generative AI can help brainstorm search terms, identify possible subtopics, translate a broad question into narrower questions, summarize material you provide, compare notes, or suggest what evidence might be missing. It can be useful at the beginning and middle of research because it reduces friction.

But fluency is not evidence. A model can combine correct facts with invented names, dates, quotations, publications, legal cases, statistics, or citations. The more plausible the fabrication, the more dangerous it becomes to a writer who is moving quickly.

Verify Every Consequential Claim

If an AI system supplies a fact you intend to publish, locate the underlying source. Open it. Confirm that the source exists, says what the AI claimed, applies to the correct date and jurisdiction, and has not been quoted out of context. If the system provides citations, verify them individually rather than assuming citation formatting means citation accuracy.

Never manufacture a source because the prose needs support. If you cannot verify the claim, remove it, qualify it, or continue researching.

Resolve Contradictions Instead of Hiding Them

Serious research eventually produces disagreement. Contradictory sources are not evidence that research failed; they are often where the real work begins.

Find the Source of the Difference

Two sources may use different definitions, time periods, geographic boundaries, datasets, translations, or methods. They may be answering different questions while appearing to disagree. Compare the underlying evidence before choosing a side.

Weight Evidence, Do Not Vote

Research is not decided by counting links. Five derivative articles based on one flawed report do not outweigh a well-supported primary record. Evaluate independence, proximity to evidence, methodology, transparency, and relevance.

Challenge Your Preferred Answer

Confirmation bias is especially dangerous when the research supports what the writer already wants to believe. Deliberately search for the strongest credible evidence against your emerging conclusion. If your argument survives, it becomes stronger. If it changes, the research has done its job.

When the evidence remains genuinely unsettled, write the uncertainty rather than forcing false precision.

Try It Now: The Writer's Edge Research System

Use this six-step system for every substantial writing project. It is intentionally simple enough to repeat.

- 1. DEFINE — What exactly do I need to know? Why does the manuscript need the answer? What would count as sufficient evidence?
- 2. DISCOVER — Which search terms, databases, archives, people, and tools can reveal leads? What vocabulary do experts use that I do not yet know?
- 3. VERIFY — What is the strongest available source? Can I trace the claim to original evidence? Do independent sources agree, and if not, why?
- 4. RECORD — Have I captured full source details, page/location, access date or version, and my own notes? Can I distinguish quotation, paraphrase, and interpretation?
- 5. INTEGRATE — Does this information serve the reader? Have I preserved my own voice? Is attribution clear?
- 6. AUDIT — What could have changed? What could be wrong? What entered through AI or a derivative source and still needs direct verification?
