Protect the Human Core of the Work

The most important AI decision is not which system to use. It is deciding what you will not delegate.

For one author that boundary may be all prose. For another it may be final language, character decisions, argument, and voice while AI helps with organization or questions. The boundary can vary by project, but it should be intentional.

Define the Human Core

Identify the parts of the work that make it yours: lived experience, original argument, narrative voice, character choices, humor, structure, interpretation, selection of evidence, emotional meaning, and the final language presented to readers. These are not chores to eliminate. They are authorship.

A tool can help you examine those elements without replacing them. Ask for counterarguments to test an essay. Ask for questions a skeptical reader might raise. Ask it to identify where a timeline is unclear. Then make the creative decision yourself.

Assistance Is Not the Same as Generation

There is a practical difference between using software to locate a repeated phrase and asking it to rewrite an entire chapter. There is also a difference between brainstorming ten possible complications and inserting a generated scene unchanged. Authors should know where their own workflow sits on that spectrum.

Use AI for Brainstorming Without Letting It Think for You

Brainstorming is one of the safest and most useful places to experiment because possibilities are not final prose.

The danger is sameness. Generative systems are very good at producing plausible patterns. Plausible is not the same as original.

Ask for Questions Before Answers

Instead of asking for a plot, ask for twenty questions about the protagonist's goal, opposition, contradictions, and consequences. Instead of asking for a nonfiction outline, ask what a skeptical reader would need proven. Questions keep the author in the decision seat.

Another useful method is constraint testing. Give the system your premise and ask what assumptions it appears to make. Ask what consequences you may have overlooked. Ask which parts feel familiar. Use the answers as pressure tests, not instructions.

Generate Alternatives, Then Leave the Screen

If you use AI to produce possibilities, do not automatically choose the first polished option. Collect ideas, close the tool, and make the decision in your own notes. Combining, rejecting, reversing, and reimagining suggestions is more likely to produce work that reflects you.

A good brainstorming session should leave you with better questions and clearer choices. If it leaves you with pages of prose you feel obligated to keep because they arrived quickly, the tool has begun driving the project.
