What This Book Will Do for You

Protect Character From Algorithmic Average

Characters become memorable because they are specific, contradictory, and inconvenient.

Start With Human Particularity

Give the system facts you have already decided rather than asking it to invent the entire person. Define the character's desire, fear, history, contradiction, social context, private shame, and relationship to power.

Then use AI to test questions: What pressure exposes this contradiction? What consequence would this person hate most?

Reject Stereotype Completion

AI may complete incomplete character descriptions with familiar cultural assumptions. Treat that as a warning, not a shortcut.

Research communities and experiences responsibly, and use human readers or subject-matter expertise when representation requires it.

Keep Voice Human

A character voice grows across hundreds of choices. Maintain a voice sheet with vocabulary, sentence habits, humor, evasions, sensory priorities, and what the character never says directly.

Use tools to flag inconsistency rather than manufacture the voice wholesale.

Develop a Voice That Cannot Be Reduced to a Prompt

The strongest defense against generic fiction is a more specific author.

Feed the Writer, Not the Model

Read outside your genre. Visit places. Listen to people. Study history. Notice regional language. Learn skills. Collect sensory details. Experience art that has nothing to do with your current project.

A richer human input creates richer human choices.

Keep a Language Notebook

Record phrases, observations, images, questions, contradictions, sounds, gestures, and details that catch your attention.

Your private noticing becomes raw material no generic prompt can duplicate.

Revise Toward Specificity

Replace generalized emotion with behavior, generalized setting with chosen detail, and generalized conflict with consequences unique to these characters.

Voice is built from accumulated specificity.

- Do your drafts and notes document a meaningful human creative process?
- Have important factual claims been verified outside generative output?
- Have platform disclosure requirements been checked?
- Have copyright-registration questions been reviewed accurately?
- Would you be comfortable explaining your process to a reader, publisher, or rights partner?
